Recreation and Commerce Committee, Morgantown Chamber of Commerce, and UMRA. At right are Peggy Myers-Smith, CEO and Executive Director Greater Morgantown Convention & Visitors Bureau, Barry Pallay, Chair, MRRCC, Chamber of Commerce, & V-P of UMRA, Charles Huguenard, V-P & General Manager, Longview Power, and Frank Jernejcic, WVDNR, who served as a tour guide along with Wallace Venable, UMRA.

Historical information, current uses of the river, and potential new uses were among the topics of discussion. Shoreside develop-



ments were observed from the very educational viewpoint of the river traveler (some say river rat). Water quality, access to the river for fishing and for boaters, campsites, WV bass tournaments, the Upper Mon Water Trail, trash and debris problem, need for full-service marina and fuel sales sites, and other related matters were topics of conversation.

Attention was given to the importance of recognizing the role of the Corps of Engineers, of access to locks for recreational boating, and Corps funding shortfalls for maintenance and improvement of river transportation. *(Judy Reckart photo)*
